This KKA Data Release is part of the Aid in Danger project, by Insecurity Insight. It is prepared from information available in local, national and international news outlets and online databases.

Access to sources differs from country to country and each source has its own strengths and weaknesses, resulting in reporting limitations and selection biases that need to be considered when comparing countries, years, or categories of incidents. The incidents reported are not a complete nor a representative list of all events that affected the provision of aid delivery and have not been independently verified. Data collection is ongoing, and data may change as more information is made available. Where the number of aid workers affected is unspecified, one is counted. All decisions made, on the basis of, or with consideration to, such information remains the responsibility of their respective organisations.
